Quality of Education (Intent, Implementation and Impact)

- The quality of education provided is exceptional.
- Pupils' work across the curriculum is consistently of a high quality.
- Pupils consistently achieve highly, particularly the most disadvantaged.
 - Pupils with SEND achieve exceptionally well.

Intent

- Leaders adopt or construct a curriculum that is ambitious and designed to give all pupils, particularly disadvantaged pupils and including pupils with SEND, the knowledge and cultural capital they need to succeed in life.
 - The school's curriculum is coherently planned and sequenced towards cumulatively sufficient knowledge and skills for future learning and employment.
 - The curriculum is successfully adapted, designed or developed to be ambitious and meet the needs of pupils with SEND
 - The school's curriculum is coherently planned and sequenced towards cumulatively sufficient knowledge and skills for future learning and employment.

Implementation

- Teachers have good knowledge of the subject(s) and courses they teach. Leaders provide effective support for those teaching outside their main areas of expertise.
- Teachers present subject matter clearly, promoting appropriate discussion about the subject matter being taught. They check pupils' understanding systematically, identify misconceptions accurately and provide clear, direct feedback. In so doing, they respond and adapt their teaching as necessary without unnecessarily elaborate or individualised approaches.
 - Over the course of study, teaching is designed to help pupils to remember long term the content they have been taught and to integrate new knowledge into larger ideas.
 - Teachers and leaders use assessment well. Leaders understand the limitations of assessment and do not use it in a way that creates unnecessary burdens on staff or pupils.
 - Teachers create an environment that focuses on pupils.
 - The work given to pupils is demanding and matches the aims of the curriculum in being coherently planned and sequenced towards cumulatively sufficient knowledge.
 - Reading is prioritised to allow pupils to access the full curriculum offer.
 - A rigorous and sequential approach to the reading curriculum develops pupils' fluency, confidence and enjoyment in reading. At all stages, reading attainment is assessed and gaps are addressed quickly and effectively for all pupils. Reading books connect closely to the phonics knowledge pupils are taught when they are learning to read.
 - The sharp focus on ensuring that younger children gain phonics knowledge and language comprehension necessary to read, and the skills to communicate, gives them the foundations for future learning.
 - Teachers ensure that their own speaking, listening, writing and reading of English support pupils in developing their language and vocabulary well.

Impact

- Pupils develop detailed knowledge and skills across the curriculum and, as a result, achieve well. This is reflected in results from national tests and examinations that meet government expectations, or in the qualifications obtained.
- Pupils are ready for the next stage of education, employment or training. They have the knowledge and skills they need and, where relevant, they gain qualifications that allow them to go on to destinations that meet their interests and aspirations and the intention of their course of study. Pupils with SEND achieve the best possible outcomes.
 - Pupils' work across the curriculum is of good quality.
 - Pupils read widely and often, with fluency and comprehension appropriate to their age. They are able to apply mathematical knowledge, concepts and procedures appropriately for their age.

Quality of Education Evaluation December 2022

INTENT

- 1) All SEN children made expected levels of progress in R, W and M in Term 1 and in many cases they made more than 1 point of progress. These children are being incredibly well supported and the provision in place is exemplary.
- 2) Much has been developed and refined in the areas of English and Maths – the team have had extensive time and support to consider and adopt improvements. Decisions around phonics and reading groups have been made. Both having been observed across the school. Colleagues in R and KS1 have had the opportunity to observe each other's phonic sessions. Maths Mastery has been relaunched and the Maths lead has supported our KS1 colleagues to make necessary amendments. Reduction of reading sessions in Jan 23 has been agreed to provide KS1 with more opportunities to undertake the Maths Mastery lessons to gain a greater balance between English and Maths.
- 3) Much work has been undertaken on ensuring that our foundation subjects are taught through the use of key learning objectives, skills and now concepts. These are all being used to hook the children's learning together. To hopefully help the children to see how learning is multi faceted and how it helps to commit learning to their long term memory. Concepts were fully introduced at the start of Term 1 and were reviewed and refined at the end of Term 1. They have been shared with the whole teaching team, as well as Governors at QoE meeting. Foundation Subject leaders will be observing their subjects in Term 3. However many have already undertaken observations and book scrutiny – impact has been a rethink about how the KS2 sketch books are being used.
- 4) A huge emphasis on vocabulary has had a positive impact on the children's acquisition of subject specific vocabulary and many of these words have been used as part of our spelling expectations too. Every lesson has an opportunity to focus on the vocabulary within a lesson and time is given to discuss its definition and relevance.

IMPLEMENTATION

1. LW Catch up sessions have been well received, however they were not started until Term 2 as LW did not provide them until then for Year R and KS1. Also the children needed to complete assessments prior to highlighting which children needed this additional support. Dr Crowther has provided a group of children in KS2 with catch up sessions and these children have made great progress.
2. Reading for pleasure – reading groups have been fantastic so far this year. Our commitment to 4 sessions a week was sustained throughout Term 1 and 2 and the whole team have been committed to ensuring these sessions are of quality. Recent observations by Dr Crowther and Claire Hargrove, Governor for English highlighted the quality and diversity of the texts being used. After pupil progress meetings, parents of children who were not being supported in this area as much as we would like were emailed by the head to ask them to reinvest in their child's reading.
3. We have very much shifted from detailed written feedback in children's writing lessons to the use of more immediate verbal feedback. The impact has been significant to children picking up on errors immediately as well as significantly reducing the team's workload. Again, all the team have had some support in 'What is effective feedback?' and 'How does it look?' and over the course of the year – this will be continually reviewed.
4. The focus on Oracy has not begun formally – but will form part of our work with the juniors in January - when they have the opportunity to have a virtual workshop with an author. Dr Crowther is currently planning activities around this event focussed on Oracy.
5. Mastering number for this year has been launched and KS1 have been well supported by Mrs Joshua. It is another additional activity, which the team had initially struggled to fit in as regularly as we would like, but these issues have been resolved this term by planning for 5 weeks within this 7 week term (Term 2) and the changes that will be made from January 2023 will further support timings for this new initiative.
6. Teaching for Mastery is gradually becoming well embedded across the school. Again Mrs Joshua has provided great support to the team at team meetings, as well as individual support where needed. Resources have been identified to support this area and maths progress and attainment is at least good across the school.
7. Mrs Joshua, Maths lead has devised Maths Concepts recently and these will be shared in Jan 2023.
8. Times Tables Rock Stars has been a revelation across KS2 – levels of engagement are regularly assessed and children are incredibly competitive and making great leaps in their instant recall and application of their tables! We love it. Mrs Joshua is regularly promoting it and certificates and celebrations are a weekly feature of whole school assemblies.

Quality of Education Evaluation December 2022

IMPACT

- 1) Target of 85% for Good Level of Development still stands for the end of the EYFS now that the team have completed baseline assessments. We have also recently purchased Language Link to support the many children who have been identified as having Speech and Language issues.
- 2) End of KS1 target after assessments at the end of Term 1 now sits at 74% - I am trying to find a way of providing some additional support for this cohort in Terms 3 and 4 to increase the number of children at expected levels in this year group. The class do have some significant needs, but there are some children that with a huge push, might be able to reach expected levels.
- 3) KS2 targets for the end of the year after assessments in Term 1 has now being reduced to 81% from 85%. Again- we hope to increase this figure, but with 1 child having missed 5 weeks of school in Term 1, who continues to be absent, the figure of 81% is more realistic as this point in the year.
- 4) The target of 85% of Year 1 to pass the Phonics Test – we believe that this is a realistic target based on recent assessments. Thank god! Maybe even higher!
- 5) All our SEN and PP children have made at least expected progress in each area – R, W and M and many have had a great start to the year and made 2 points progress when the expectation is 1.
- 6) The 2 pupil premium children in Year 1 are targeted to pass the phonic test. One child in Year 1 who has just been entered on to the SEN register may not – but is receiving targeted support to make progress in this key area.

Quality of Education Evaluation March 2023

INTENT

- 1) 57% of our SEN children have made expected levels+ of progress in Reading since September 2022. 52% made expected levels + in Writing and 42% made expected levels + in Maths. All children have made progress in all areas, but not the 4 points expected.
- 2) In recent lesson observations (Terms 3 and 4), all SEN children have been well catered for and have been provided with strategies, differentiation and support to ensure access to all areas of the curriculum. They have been part of the pupil voice captures for all subjects and have been very positive about their experiences.
- 3) Lesson observations in all subjects over the last two terms have proven that teaching is consistently high and that colleagues are confident and secure in their subject knowledge, are using great questioning to secure understanding and are doing all they can to reduce the gaps with some learners but equally challenge the more able in these subjects.
- 4) Performance Management Observations in Term 4 have wholly been monitoring the use of knowledge, skills vocabulary and concepts. EVERY lesson has addressed these key components of learning with vigour. EVERY lesson has shown how all these components have made the learning accessible, transferable and memorable.
- 5) Vocabulary and language acquisition is high – it is part of every sequence of learning in all subjects. Incredibly impressive!

IMPLEMENTATION

- 1) Little Wandle Phonic teaching is now embedded and taught incredibly well across KS1. Catch up sessions for children who need them have them regularly. The Phonic Test in Year 1 has a target of 85% and current assessments indicate this is accurate with maybe an increase. Our 8 children who did not pass in Year 1 – 4 are targeted for passing it this year – with all 8 having made significant progress in their learning. The additional sessions are paying dividends towards children's accuracy and confidence in this crucial area.
- 2) Reading for pleasure-Readers theatre across KS2 ensures that all children experience, delve deeply into and comprehend high quality texts. Story Telling Week was much loved by the whole school and purchasing of books at our book fairs was at a record high!
- 3) Handwriting has been a massive focus this year and presentation is crucial. Letterjoin has been well received (handwriting scheme) and it is taught daily in KS1 and offered to those children who need it in KS2. Presentation across the school, on the whole is fantastic.
- 4) We are still developing our focus on oracy, but storytelling week was the first stage of this. Our author visits both in person and via zoom have focused on oracy/ storytelling and children have loved them.
- 5) Mastering Number has been a massive focus in KS1 and children are making leaps in their learning. 84% in the EYFS are on track in Number. 86% of the children in Year 1 are on track to be at expected + with 71% currently on track to be expected+ in Year 2. Mastering Number lessons have been observed and feedback provided. Maths lead and Year 1 teacher continue to attend and apply their learning as part of the project as well as disseminating practice across the key stage,
- 6) Developing Mastery across the school is a real focus. Maths lessons are embedded in the mastery approach. Children are making decisions about their own learning and when they are ready to tackle it. Currently 81% of the children in Year 3 are on track to achieve expected +, 81% in Year 4, 90% in Year 5 and 81% in Year 6 in Maths.
- 7) Key skills and concepts in maths have been developed. Our subject lead has undertaken research and devised mathematical concepts with definitions and has shown the whole team how to utilise them to develop mathematical understanding even further.
- 8) Times Table Rockstar has been incredibly successful in engaging our children in KS2 with improving their Times Tables. Fortnightly an assembly is led to promote and reward individual participation and success as well as rewards for whole class endeavours. Year 4 tackled a multiplication check in TTR akin to the national Times Table Check that they will experience later this year and the results were staggering! 80% of the children passed the test this early in the year!

IMPACT

1. 85% of the EYFS are on track to reach the GLD targets set. KS1 is lower than we set (85%) as it currently stands at 74%. KS2 currently stands at 81% (not the 85% set) However all children identified as being able to achieve expected at this point in time are receiving and inordinate amount of support to help them attain this level. The children who may not achieve expected within their year group are still making progress and in many cases are making the class expected level of progress.

The school is very community based which can only be a good thing. I think that the teachers are very focussed on the education of our children.

Behaviour & Attitudes Evaluation December 2022

1. Having undertaken a pupil voice capture for PSHE- it is clear that the children do enjoy using Jigsaw. They love their own reflective journals as no-one looks at their comments, unless they are keen to share. They like the Jigsaw Characters and have noticed that the concepts have been reviewed this term and are slightly different to last term. The team seem to like the structure and the lesson make up! Useable, friendly and covers the full range of areas for learning in this subject – apart from explicit online safety which Mr Burns has supplemented this year for each year group.
2. Much has been done after Mrs Cresswell's Governor Visit where she met with a group of children to discuss Safeguarding and Online Safety. On the back of her findings and monitoring report – we as a whole school have reignited the children's knowledge regarding Pantasaurus and Child Line's Number and how it can be used. Children have used the Post Box which has been a new initiative this year. Mr Burns in both Term 1 and 2 has led Online Safety assemblies and parents have been alerted to their responsibilities in supporting their children regularly through school comms. Safer Internet Day is planned for early in the new year and again the whole school will participate in this alongside a workshop for parents on the day.
3. Children have been regularly reminded who they can turn to if they have any worries and problems both in PSHE lessons and in assemblies. Anti Bullying Week this term was focussed on 'Reaching Out' and some hard hitting assemblies have been led, to reiterate zero tolerance to repeated acts of unkindness.
4. Through our TRUST values and rays of the lighthouse, our children are very aware of how their learning behaviours and behaviours in general afford them levels of academic success and well-being. Every assembly addresses an issue- whether it is through the contents of a story, newsround clips where people have triumphed. This is as strong as ever at Cobham and only a small handful of children have needed strong reminders of our expectations. However the lunch hall and lunchtimes seems somewhat frenetic and I am doing all I can to create a calmer environment whilst enforcing the same expectations in these spaces as we expect in the classrooms.
5. I led an assembly on Memory this term as a taster for discussions and further assemblies surrounding 'How we learn best?' Children were able to articulate the types of learners that they think they are and loved some of the memory games that we played as a whole school. The team have had further CPD/ support in this area and there is more training planned in Term 3 with the view that teams start to develop the children's understanding of 'memory' and 'working memory' over the remainder of the year!
6. Well – we have fined one family for persistent absence, and I haven't been shot on the front gate yet! Win Win!

Our school's TRUST values (Tolerance, Strength, Unity, Respect, Truth) are threaded through the fabric of the school and it is clear they fully inform the quality of relationships within it. Adults and children treat each other with kindness and respect and the atmosphere around the school is such that children feel safe, happy and ready to learn.'

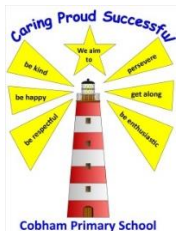

Behaviour & Attitudes Evaluation March 2023

- 1) Pupil Survey in Term 3 had a very positive response from the children. To the question 'I enjoy school' - 99% said yes! 98% would recommend Cobham to another person! My school encourages me to respect people and treat everyone equally-99% said yes!
- 2) In lessons observed by subject leads in Term 3 and 4 – levels of engagement were remarked upon as high by all children in a variety of subjects!
- 3) Our Safeguarding Governor met with a group of children and it was a great reminder that our children needed more support in keeping themselves safe. Interestingly enough- they did not necessarily mean 'online' but outside of school – at clubs, activities and family days out. I lead a longer than usual assembly and addressed many of their issues and parents were informed of the concerns that the children had and how we (and they) could address them. NSPCC Childline number was once again shared and is visible around the school.
- 4) Mental Health Week was experienced and children across the classes had a range of activities to think about and complete. Our children are every aware that mental strength is linked to our TRUST values and is part of their skill set to becoming a good learner.
- 5) Safer Internet Day once again was celebrated in Term 4 and children are very aware of how to keep themselves safe online, Mr Burns led a workshop for parents which was attended by a few parents, many of whom, said it was incredibly informative.
- 6) More work on Memory has been promoted in assemblies – we play a far and wide reaching number of games to promote learning and we how we all learn best and differently has been regularly shared.
- 7) Parent Survey Results Feb 2023 – were incredibly positive. 101 families responded. 100% of these families said that their children feel safe, are happy in school and behave well! 97% stated that we support their child's wider development with 99% stating that they would recommend Cobham. Great results!
- 8) CPD in metacognition has been ongoing and team members are trialling a number of strategies and resources this year with some great success. The team have looked at research and have amended practice and made learning and memory explicit within their teaching to support the children in making links within their own learning. This research is ongoing.
- 9) Persistent Absence is 7.8% (below 90%) at the end of Term 3 and this number includes 17 pupils, but this is significantly reduced since the end of Term 2 which was 13.3%! Our Penalty notice last term was not fully applied as KCC made an error!
- 10) PSHE is a real strength of the school and this would be a subject worth having a deep dive in for Ofsted!
- 11) Our Team Survey undertaken in term 3 – 25 members of the team responded with 18 stating that they 'strongly agree' that they enjoy working at Cobham and that 7'agreed. 'The school has a culture that encourages a calm and orderly conduct and is aspirational for all pupils' had a response of 96% strongly agreeing!
- 12) Children's behaviours towards each other are always good and where children need direction, we utilise our TRUST values and rays of the lighthouse to discuss the issues. These have always worked incredibly well and the children are fully conversant with their meanings and our expectations of their use.

We have found the school to be very supportive and listen to parents' concerns. Our child has come on leaps and bounds since starting school

and he is developing a love of learning. Parent Survey 2023

Personal Development Evaluation December 2022

- 1) Weekly assemblies focus on 'Being Kind' and what this might look like on a practical level. The majority of our children are amazing and are great school citizens. Our TRUST values do uphold any conversations needed to be had with children who make mistakes.
- 2) We always encourage a love for 'out of school pursuits' and we have not held a Talent Day this school year. A date has been put in the diary for Term 3. However I know that in younger classes, they still facilitate a weekly 'Show and Tell' session!
- 3) We have had a wide and varied extra curricular timetable this year- all of which have involved children from different year groups – often two fold in many cases but some clubs encourage children from across key stages too. This allows children to spend time with older and younger children.
- 4) Challenge is part and parcel of our Quality first teaching and recent data capture at the end of Term 1 indicates that a good proportion of children each class are at exceeding in the 3 key areas. 25%+ at exceeding in each class.
- 5) Debate Day will start in January 2023 alongside the Oracy work planned alongside our virtual author visit!
- 6) Well being and mental health have been a massive priority this year for children and parents alike. We offered a workshop for parents and although not overly well-attended, those that did thoroughly enjoyed the chance to meet. Our SEN roadshow had more attendees and again parents enjoyed the opportunity to share their experiences and support of each other. Anti Bullying Week Assemblies had a focus on how unkindness can effect our well-being and what can be done to refocus our mind and have inner strength to deal with such times.

Personal Development Evaluation March 2023

- 1) Personal development is at the very core of all that we hold dear at Cobham. Celebrating children's gifts and talents has been at the forefront of our vision this year. We have held 2 'in class talent shows' to showcase the children's plethora of talents and this Term (4) we have organised the whole school talent show which had more auditions than ever before! Showcasing everyone's gifts and talents is at the heart of all that we do!
- 2) We are working hard on children understanding that what they are 'good at', such as Maths, PE etc is not necessarily their true talent – so we have a fundamental focus on their attributes and qualities as people. This is something very important for our children who might find learning in all areas hard. We are recognising their more personal and much needed personal qualities to be good citizens. The children have loved exploring this as an idea. This has been the main focus in many whole school assemblies.
- 3) Enrichment activities and Cultural Capital experiences have always been strong at Cobham – but the children understand how lucky many of them are and want to make a difference in many ways. Our school council regularly bring to the table, their desire to make a difference to the world, from supporting local charities – Gravesham Foodbank to supporting the people suffering in the recent Turkish earthquake.
- 4) After school clubs during the last two terms have been incredibly plentiful- all teaching team members have lead clubs from Maths club, Art Club KS1 and KS2, Running Club, Minecraft Club, Card Game Club, Dance Club, Choir alongside Centre Stage (Performing Arts) Hannah May (Dance) Dodgeball, Gymnastics & Basketball.
- 5) Year R had a term at the Forest School which they loved and Year 5 and Year 6 have participated in swimming lessons! Many children were nervous about these experiences, but were formidable in attending and facing their fears!
- 6) The children are fully aware that as PE lead I am trying to find 'A sport for all' by the time they leave Year 6 and in a recent pupil voice capture for PE, they offered many ideas of experiences and sporting opportunities that they would like me to plan!
- 7) The last 2 terms has seen a very popular 'Lego Day' alongside Maths Week, Story telling Week incorporating WBD, Mental Health Week, Theatre Productions, Road Safety Talks for the whole school, Mobile Library Visit, Year 5 Science Museum, Year 6s trip to Bletchley Park after an impromptu cinema trip! As well as many musical opportunities being offered too!
- 8) The whole team also undertook 'Zones of Regulation Training' at the start of Term 3 which was invaluable for us moving forwards in supporting children with their own personal development and well-being.

This has meant that Governors have challenged and asked questions and sought clarification in all these areas. These challenges and responses have been minuted accordingly, ensuring an upskilling of information and development in areas of expertise/responsibility.
- 2) Monitoring has been extensive too over the last two terms – Governors have observed in the EYFS, in Maths, English & SEN. They have attended informally assemblies, discos, Remembrance Day as well as school council meetings. Our SEN Governor also attended the Well being Workshop for parents and the SEN Roadshow for parents of children with SEND.
- 3) Headteacher's Performance Management was undertaken, and performance was evaluated with new targets set & agreed for the academic year.
- 4) All governors have fulfilled the expectations of the rigorous Safeguarding Training from KCSIE online training as well as bespoke training led by KCC and they have revisited Prevent Training.
- 5) Our Safeguarding Governor, Kate Cresswell, met with a group of children to discuss 'Keeping yourself safe' and her findings were shared and acted upon. Impact being a review of the Pantasaurus story and the Childline number being shared again with the whole school and made even more visible in and around the school environment. Mr Burns, DDSL, also led another Online Safety assembly after this monitoring exercise.
- 6) I think an anonymous wellbeing survey might be the way forward to find out about the team's feelings and views about well-being. This could be something for Term 3 alongside the team survey.

'There is a high emphasis on professional development and this helps to ensure practice is up to date and personalised. All subject leaders access the National College. Staff are valued and their work life balance is taken into account when making organisational decisions. For example, all teachers receive double their PPA entitlement. On a tour of the school, the impact of initiatives such as this was clearly evident. Staff seemed enthusiastic, happy and energised. These are key qualities if children are to consistently receive a high quality education.'

Leadership & Management Evaluation March 2023

1. Our team continues to drive school improvement at every level. Governors have undertaken further training in their areas and monitoring visits have been undertaken. Formal monitoring in English, Maths, SEN, EYFS and History took place in Term 3 alongside informal monitoring where governors attended assemblies, school council meetings and sporting events. Governor Training has been in PP and SEN, PE Provision and Mental Health and Well-being.
2. Our French and Music lead have also presented to Governors regarding the leadership and development of their subjects as part of a cycle where all leads will share their impact in these areas.
3. We have recruited 3 new governors in Term 3 and 4 and all have undertaken their KCSIE 2023 Training, PREVENT and CSE training.
4. All subject leads in Term 3 and 4 have undertaken observations in their subjects as well as book scrutinies and captured pupil voice for their area of leadership. These findings in English and Maths have been shared at Governor meetings and governors with subject responsibilities.
5. Teaching team have had CPD and training on Meta-Cognition, Effective Feedback, Memory and GPAS in recent terms- all of which are improving our understanding and development of these key areas of learning.
6. Team Survey was completed in Term 3 and the result were incredibly positive – all members who completed it said that they were proud to be members of the team at Cobham and all agreed that the school was well led and managed.
7. Workload is always high but teams are given time to complete tasks where possible such as starting Term 3s parent's information sharing sessions in the afternoon, so that the day is not extended into the evening, as well as having report writing time dedicated so that it is not always on top of the usual workload that exists. Staff meetings are often used for data collection, as well as providing time to do analysis. Deadlines are reasonable at every level.
8. Safeguarding continues to always be a priority. Team concerns are recorded and dealt with by DSL-communications/contact with parents are always shared as are outcomes/follow up actions.
9. DSL had completed training and attended DSL network training and collaboration meetings. Safeguarding newsletters and aspects that are relevant are always shared with the whole team. Reminders are regularly shared about the 4Rs and the 4Cs.
10. Headteacher's mid year performance review was undertaken in term 4 by Governors.
11. Our Safeguarding Governor attended an assembly that the children had requested on 'keeping yourself safe' and her notes were shared with all Governors.

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EFFECTIVENESS OF THE EARLY YEARS PROVISION: QUALITY & STANDARDS

- The quality of early years education provided is exceptional.
- The EYFS curriculum provides no limits or barriers to the children’s achievements, regardless of their backgrounds, circumstances or needs. The high ambition it embodies is shared by all staff.
- The impact of the curriculum on what children know, can remember and do is strong. Children demonstrate this through being deeply engaged and sustaining high levels of concentration. Children, including those from disadvantaged backgrounds, do well. Children with SEND achieve the best possible outcomes.
- Children are highly motivated and are eager to join in. They share and cooperate well, demonstrating high levels of self-control and respect for others. Children consistently keep on trying hard, particularly if they encounter difficulties.

INTENT

- Leaders adopt or construct a curriculum that is ambitious and designed to give children, particularly the most disadvantaged, the knowledge, self-belief and cultural capital they need to succeed in life.
- The curriculum is coherently planned and sequenced. It builds on what children know and can do, towards cumulatively sufficient knowledge and skills for their future learning.
- There is a sharp focus on ensuring that children acquire a wide vocabulary, communicate effectively and, in Reception, secure a knowledge of phonics, which gives them the foundations for future learning, especially in preparation for them to become confident and fluent readers.
- The school’s approach to teaching early reading and synthetic phonics is systematic and ensures that all children learn to read words and simple sentences accurately by the end of Reception.
- The school has the same academic ambitions for almost all children. For children with particular needs, such as those with SEND, their curriculum is designed to be ambitious and to meet their needs.

IMPLEMENTATION

- Children benefit from meaningful learning across the curriculum.
- Staff are knowledgeable about the areas of learning they teach. They manage the EYFS curriculum and pedagogy in relation to the learning needs of their children. Staff are expert in teaching systematic, synthetic phonics and ensure that children practise their reading from books that match their phonics knowledge.
- Staff present information clearly to children, promoting appropriate discussion about the subject matter being taught. They communicate well to check children’s understanding, identify misconceptions and provide clear explanations to improve their learning. In so doing, they respond and adapt their teaching as necessary.
 - Staff read to children in a way that excites and engages them, introducing new ideas, concepts and vocabulary.
- Staff are knowledgeable about the teaching of early mathematics. They ensure that children have sufficient practice to be confident in using and understanding numbers. The mathematics curriculum provides a strong basis for more complex learning later on. Over the EYFS, teaching is designed to help children remember long term what they have been taught and to integrate new knowledge into larger concepts. This is checked well by staff and leaders. Leaders understand the limitations of assessment and avoid unnecessary burdens on staff or children.

- Staff create an environment that supports the intent of an ambitious, coherently planned and sequenced curriculum. The resources are chosen to meet the children’s needs and promote learning.
- The curriculum and care practices promote and support children’s emotional security and development of their character. Leaders and staff are particularly attentive to the youngest children’s needs.
- Staff give clear messages to children about why it is important to eat, drink, rest, exercise and be kind to each other. They teach children to take managed risks and challenges as they play and learn, supporting them to be active and develop physically.
- Staff provide information for parents about their children progress, in line with the requirements of the EYFS. They provide information to parents about supporting their child’s learning at home, including detail about the school’s method of teaching reading and how to help their children learn to read.

IMPACT

- Children develop detailed knowledge and skills across the seven areas of learning in an age-appropriate way. Children develop their vocabulary and use it across the EYFS curriculum. By the end of Reception, children use their knowledge of phonics to read accurately and with increasing speed and fluency.
- Children are ready for the next stage of education, especially Year 1 in school, if applicable. They have the knowledge and skills they need to benefit from what school has to offer when it is time to move on. By the end of Reception, children achieve well, particularly those children with lower starting points.
- By the end of Reception, children have the personal, physical and social skills they need to succeed in the next stage of their education. Most children achieve the early learning goals, particularly in mathematics and literacy.
- Children enjoy, listen attentively and respond with comprehension to familiar stories, rhymes and songs that are appropriate to their age and stage of development. Children develop their vocabulary and understanding of language across the seven areas of learning.
- Children demonstrate their positive attitudes to learning through high levels of curiosity, concentration and enjoyment. They listen intently and respond positively to adults and each other. Children are developing their resilience to setbacks and take pride in their achievements.
- Children are beginning to manage their own feelings and behaviour, understanding how these have an impact on others. They are developing a sense of right from wrong.
 - Children have a good understanding of oral health, eating healthily and the importance of exercise.

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Effectiveness of the EYFS Evaluation March 2023

1. We have spent time this term looking at our curriculum over the year and ensuring the learning is built on from previous learning, but also to ensure that the curriculum is a stepping stones towards learning as they move into year one. This a document which will continue to develop as the year progresses.
2. Both Reception teachers attended the STEM EYFS conference in February. The conference focused on how Maths can be everywhere, looking at how spatial reasoning can be taught through play in the classroom, the use of resources and what the progression in Maths looks like. A large focus on allowing space for the learner to explain their thinking and the adult's role in this, by not always filling the gap with conversation, but sitting back and observing. This is something we will be explore more of in the coming terms.
3. Many children have received interventions over the past two terms; we have seen good progress in these children. We will be looking to change the interventions in terms 5 and 6 to meet the needs of the children.
4. We have been using a range of Maths books for 'Number Talk' sessions. The children have used these sessions to talk about their existing knowledge but also to gain knowledge and vocabulary to be able to explain what is happening in the pictures. The children have made estimations and we will talked about many aspects of shape, space and measure using these sessions.
5. With a new set of data we currently expect 82% children to get a GLD.
6. We have introduced daily catch up Phonics sessions for those children who need extra support; we have seen good progress for these children this term.
7. We have started to split the class for Phonic sessions to ensure the teaching is adaptive to the needs of the children. Ensuring the children are challenged and supported effectively.
8. Vocabulary is continually being developed and continues to be a large focus on Reception. It has been lovely to see the children using the new vocabulary taught in their everyday learning.
9. The children spent one day a week in term 3 at Forest School.
10. Linked to our learning, the children have enjoyed an African Drumming Workshop.
11. Parents have been invited into class for a stay and share session.
